CHAPTER 13 TRUSTEE EDKY PROTOCOL REGARDING A DEBTOR'S LACK OF PROOF OF SSN AT THE SECTION 341 MEETING

If a debtor appears at the section 341 meeting and does not have acceptable proof* of his/her social security number, I require this protocol:

- 1) The debtor must personally appear at the office of the debtor's attorney with an original form of acceptable proof* of his/her social security number.
- 2) The debtor's attorney must personally review the original documentation, and cause a photocopy of the original to be made for the chapter 13 trustee.
- 3) The debtor's attorney must personally sign an Affidavit stating that:
 - a) The attorney has reviewed the original documentation;
 - b) The original documentation is in the form of _____ [Insert as appropriate, such as social security card, W-2, etc.].
 - c) The SSN on the original documentation does (or does not) match the SSN filed with the petition; and
 - d) A true and correct copy of the original has been mailed to the chapter 13 trustee.
- 4) The Affidavit must NOT set forth the debtor's SSN.
- 5) The debtor's attorney must file the Affidavit, but must NOT file a copy of the social security card or other evidence of the debtor's SSN.
- 6) The debtor's attorney must mail to the chapter 13 trustee:
 - a) the photocopy of the proof of SSN; and
 - b) a copy of the Affidavit.
- 7) The above-described protocol must be completed within ten (10) days following the section 341 meeting.
- 8) The debtor's attorney must ensure that the debtor's SSN is NOT disclosed to the public in any document filed in the case via ECF.

^{*} The chapter 13 trustee subscribes to the policy of the United States Trustee regarding what constitutes acceptable proof of a debtor's SSN: "Acceptable forms of proof of social security number may include the following original documents: (1) social security card, (2) medical insurance card, (3) pay stub, (4) W-2 form, (5) IRS form 1099, and (6) Social Security Administration report." A military ID which contains a photo ID and the debtor's SSN may also constitute adequate proof.
